Working together, we have secured over \$32 million in resources for our MMSD scholars, staff, schools, and families. Through your generosity, the Foundation has adapted, innovated, and created new and different ways of delivering supports to MMSD, through longstanding programs such as Adopt-a-School and School Endowments to more recent efforts such as the Madison Public Schools Friends and Alumni Network and the Teacher Support Network.

While we reflect with pride on our accomplishments, we also recognize that much has changed in the public schools' landscape since our beginnings. We often hear that public schools are the cornerstones of democracy, that they are critical to the health and vitality of a community. In holding firm to these beliefs, the Foundation now embraces a new role, a new way of doing business, that of staunch advocate, a passionate defender of Madison's public schools within our local boundaries *and*, increasingly, across our state. Which is why we launched Act Now 2 Invest, a Coalition for Wisconsin's Education and Economic Success, yet another example of the Foundation reinventing itself to meet the moment and to go boldly into the future.

Again, we thank you for being with us as donors, volunteers, taxpayers, and voters. But... we also ask you to stay true, to stand firm and to move away from

the sidelines into the heart of the fight for our public schools. Show up when called because, as we firmly believe, Schools Make Madison. We need you and our kids need you.

Innovating from idea stage to pilot to full-scale program in less than three years, the Teacher Support Network delivered thousands of items to Madison's schools in the 2021-22 school year.

The Teacher Support Network took flight during fall 2020 to provide emergency school supplies for virtual learning in response to the pandemic. More than a year later, it has transformed into a full-fledged Foundation program serving all 52 MMSD schools. The Foundation's unique model provides each school with a budget to order supplies via our online store in partnership with EZ Office Products.

The Teacher Support Network has distributed more than \$140,000 in material resources to schools since the beginning of the 2021-22 school year–and we are far from done. This program is efficient, effective, and entrepreneurial.

We Listen and Adapt

Based on teacher feedback, we continue to expand our offerings. Recently, we added hygiene items, snacks, art supplies, and recess equipment. Popular items include colored pencils, markers, notebooks, snacks, jump ropes, soccer balls, and dry-erase boards.

This meaningful work bridges gaps and fights inequities and is possible through many generous gifts from our community. We are thankful for this support which allows us to fulfill our commitment to MMSD students, teachers, and staff.

Having the right systems and responsive community partners, the Foundation delivers winter gear and books to students.

The Teacher Support Network is a program through which the Foundation can nimbly respond to opportunities as they arise. Having the right systems and responsive community partners is key. We saw two very special examples of this during the past year when the Foundation delivered books to kindergarten students and winter gear to all grade levels.

In September, we partnered with the Madison Reading Project and the school district to deliver a little library of 8 culturally appropriate books to every 5-year-old kindergarten student in the district. This was made possible through memorial gifts honoring Karen C. Ragatz, beloved mother, volunteer, and educator. The Ragatz family agreed helping students build essential literacy skills was a fitting tribute to Karen, a long-time district volunteer who then became an ESL educator at Thoreau Elementary School. We were delighted to help get the class of 2034 off to a great start!

The excitement and joy in this room is palpable! They are jumping up and down as they open these beautiful books. I am so happy to see a large number of modern, well authored and illustrated books as well as multicultural and multilingual texts. **L** It was so beautiful to see our students legitimately squeal with delight over such high interest books!

A few months later, a generous collective gift from The QTI Group, Jay and Janet Loewi, Londa and Walter Dewey, and Dave Silverberg and Betsy Huebel was quickly channeled into a high-priority student need across Madison's schools-winter outerwear. The Foundation purchased 1,944 items, integrating them into our online store and delivering directly to schools with the assistance of our key partner, EZ Office Products. Students received the gear just as the first cold snap of the season arrived.

Through our Adopt-a-School program, the Foundation works diligently to pair organizations and businesses with schools. This "matchmaking" has resulted in many meaningful connections and is one the most powerful ways to support our schools and scholars. Each year, hundreds of thousands of dollars and thousands of volunteer hours are invested by the community in our schools.

Celebrating Long-Time and New Adopt-a-School Partners

Strand Associates, Inc. and Wright Middle School have been neighbors for years and recently became an Adopt-a-School partner. In recognition of its commitment to Wright, Strand made a significant financial gift to the school. Strand also hosted a Youth Leadership Retreat for Wright students and staff at its offices, and Strand structural engineer Brett Oftedahl recently made a presentation to the 8th grade technology class.

Group Health Cooperative of South Central Wisconsin has established Adopt-a-School partnerships with six MMSD schools. The Group Health investments in our schools largely focus on health-related assets which have been particularly important over the last two years. Among other things, Group Health provides supplies to nursing staff, holiday gifts for families, and healthy snacks.

Attic Angel and Anana Elementary have one of our most enduring Adopt-a-School partnerships. Many Attic Angel members and residents are current or retired educators who understand the needs of our schools. Attic Angel has been incredibly generous when it comes to supporting the Anana community, including a significant gift to help families with rental assistance and eviction avoidance. Attic Angel member Jeanne Schultz is the point person for the partnership and she and her Therapy Dog, April consistently visit and read with students.

We welcome our newest Adopt-a-School partner: the Association of Wisconsin School Administrators. AWSA recently established an Adopt-a-School partnership with Sandburg Elementary School. In celebration of the new partnership, AWSA staff purchased almost \$400 worth of toys that were delivered to Sandburg for its Holiday Store.

Leadership and Legacy - Building for the Future

The idea for a Madison Public Schools Foundation was originally presented to the Board of Education in the 1970s by retired Superintendent Doug Ritchie. At the time, Delevan Darien was the only Wisconsin public school district with a foundation. Nearly two decades later, an education foundation was incorporated into the "Madison Schools 2000" strategic plan. The Foundation took shape over the 1999-2000 school year when Doug Ritchie and Don Hafeman led the Organizing Committee.

The visionaries who helped launch the Madison Public Schools Foundation understood that a thriving public school system needed the support of its community. One of those founders was Tripp Widder, who championed the idea of creating a public-private collaboration to support all schools in Madison. As we observe our 20th anniversary, we celebrate Tripp's leadership in helping establish a broad base of support for Madison's public schools and his personal commitment to our work. Tripp and his wife Nancy exemplify the impact individual donors can have on the Foundation. They make an annual contribution through our Schools Make Madison Champions program, and they are members of the Foundation's Legacy Circle, helping us build for the future.
